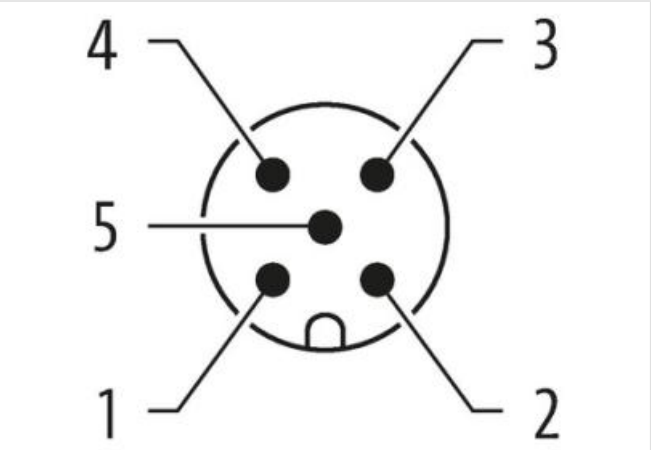

Important installation notes

Note on strain relief	Protect the connectors by suitable measures from mechanical loads, e.g. by the usage of cable ties.
